## **How Art and Artists Can Enhance Your Ministry**

What happens when Christian leaders embrace the arts, artists, and the creative process? From the moment of Creation, and continuing throughout church history, artists have served the Lord with their gifts. Art is the language of experience and the artist is designed, even called, to speak to the heart of the people. However, many struggle to understand how to incorporate their most creative people into their ministry. This workshop will discuss how the creative process is both a fully human and fully divine experience. When Christian leaders and creative people partner, everyone benefits.

Charles is founder of the Imago Dei Artists Network in Latvia and co-founder of the imagiNATIONS Annual Art Festival for Estonia and Latvia. He is a member of the Arts Centre Group in London and is the LausanneARTS Advocate at Large for Europe. Charles is an author, pianist, and painter, having studied at the feet of two masters, professors both, from the Latvian Academy of the Arts. He lives in Latvia 4-5 months per year. He has been married to Nancy for 40 years and has four grown children and nine young grandchildren.
