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

Here is a brief definition of Roman Catholicism:

Roman Catholicism is a deviation from Biblical Christianity that has consolidated over the centuries by clustering around an imperial (Roman) institution, centering on its sacramental system, grounding itself on its synergistic theology and abnormal ecclesiology, And being fueled by its universal (catholic) project of embracing the whole world.

Roman Catholicism retains significant theistic Christian elements (e.g. The Trinity, morality), yet because of its blurred theological system it departs from Biblical Christianity at all points in different ways and degrees of intensity, resulting in a confused and distorted religion.





4) Can Evangelicals Be United with Rome?

According to Rome, Christian unity is threefold:

- 1. professing the same faith,
- 2. celebrating the same Eucharist (i.e. the Roman Catholic way), and
- 3. being united under the same sacramental ministry in apostolic succession (i.e. under the Pope).



TWO OPTIONS

In dealing with Roman Catholicism are we dealing with a Philippians 1:15-21 situation or with a Galatians 1:6-9 situation?



Philippians 1:15-21

"Some indeed preach Christ from envy and rivalry, but others from good will. The latter do it out of love, knowing that I am put here for the defense of the gospel. The former proclaim Christ out of selfish ambition, not sincerely but thinking to afflict me in my imprisonment.

What then? Only that in every way, whether in pretense or in truth, Christ is proclaimed, and in that I rejoice. Yes, and I will rejoice, for I know that through your prayers and the help of the Spirit of Jesus Christ this will turn out for my deliverance, as it is my eager expectation and hope that I will not be at all ashamed, but that with full courage now as always Christ will be honored in my body, whether by life or by death. For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain." (Philippians 1.15–21 ESV)

Galatians 1:6-9

"I am astonished that you are so quickly deserting him who called you in the grace of Christ and are turning to a different gospel—not that there is another one, but there are some who trouble you and want to distort the gospel of Christ. But even if we or an angel from heaven should preach to you a gospel contrary to the one we preached to you, let him be accursed. As we have said before, so now I say again: If anyone is preaching to you a gospel contrary to the one you received, let him be accursed."

(Galatians 1.6–9 ESV)

Practical Tips: Be prepared to wrestle with the exclusive nature of the Gospel

Practical Tips: Be prepared to show the personal elements of the Christian life

Practical Tips: Be prepared to integrate personal witness and church life

Believing and Belonging go together

The importance of the ordinances, especially the Lord's supper. Catholics are not used to "listen"; they are used to see and experience through the senses and in the context of community.



Practical Tips: Preaching in a Roman Catholic context

Make sure to explain the biblical flow of the passage. In RC there is little sense of biblical theology.

Make sure you communicate the finality of Scripture. The Bible is the ultimate authority.

Make sure you carefully show the impact of the Word on daily life, e.g. personal, work, church, society

If possible quote a church father: it creates a bridge and it reclaims the fathers to the protestant faith (as the Reformers did)



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
