
The Amazing Power of History to Make a Difference Today— History as a Tool for Apologetics

By telling the story of what God has done in the past, we can see more clearly what He is doing today. As we see how followers of God served Him in the past, we learn lessons for what we should be doing today. Showing the footsteps of God in history provides a bridge for communicating the Gospel with unbelievers today. This workshop will include a panel of three Christian leaders who have effectively used history to communicate with believers and unbelievers alike. The goal of this workshop is to encourage ELF participants to learn the history of Christianity in their country or region and find ways to effectively tell that story today.

Daryl McCarthy serves as Vice President of Academic Programs and Strategy with Forum of Christian Leaders (FOCL). Besides directing the ELF Academic Network, he also directs the Cambridge Scholars Network. Daryl has traveled to 60 nations speaking at universities, conferences, and churches. After teaching at Kansas Christian College for several years, in 1988 he helped start Global Scholars and served as President until 2014.
