- A. Shows the gospel is public truth
- B. Shows that we are not afraid of questions
- C. Ensures that we scratch where people itch
- D. Helps us gauge the audience's response and understanding of what we have said
- E. Trains and encourages Christians
- F. Is enjoyable for all

II. How is a public question and answer session different to a conversation

- I. Be honest – admit your limitations
- J. Be helpful - - further reading, another talk or online resources
- K. Be prayerful – arrow prayers
