# **Apologetics and the Local Church**

The aim of this workshop is two-fold. First, attendees will explore the biblical role of the New Testament local church in the apologetic enterprise. They will examine various texts of scripture, which are pertinent to the theology that undergirds apologetics. Attendees then will engage in an interactive discussion on the application and relationship that these texts have to the proper use of 21<sup>st</sup> century apologetics. Secondly, this workshop will provide 7 proven strategies for creating an effective apologetic ministry within a local church context. Finally, attendees will leave with a clear vision for how apologetics can be cultivated in their local church by identifying and training those whose ministry is evangelism and defending the Christian faith.

Christopher Brooks is the Senior Pastor of Evangel Ministries, a 1500 member church in Detroit, Michigan. He is host of the Equipped for Life radio broadcast which airs daily on Salem Communications – Detroit Affiliate. After graduating from Michigan State University with a B.A. in Finance, Christopher begin his theological training at Michigan Theological Seminary. Pastor Brooks earned an M.A. in Christian Apologetics and Philosophy from Biola University. He also completed post-graduate work at the Oxford Centre for Christian Apologetics at Oxford University. Christopher is the founder of the Detroit Bible Institute, a seminary preparatory institution targeting inner city Christians. In 2009 Christopher published his first book, *Kingdom Dreaming*, and his currently writing his second book, *Urban Apologetics* (Kregel Publishing).

- 5.1 Interview Influencers: (Who are the decision makers?)
- 5.2 Investigate Issues: (What will it take to get this done?)
- 5.3 Institute Incentives: (How can we motivate the congregation?)
- 5.4 Indicate Instruments: (What tools will we use?)
- 5.5 Identify Individuals: (Who will we target for training?)
- 5.6 Initiate Instruction: (When will we start training?)
- 5.7 Implement Information: (How will we apply new knowledge?)

#### **Conclusion:**

The local church is the agency God has chosen for the evangelization of the world. Whenever the church retreats from her responsibility to disciple tough-minded, tender-hearted Christians who have the ability to engage the culture for Christ, we lose our influence in society. This is most clearly seen in post-reformation Western Europe. Conversely, apologists who have ministries which are disconnected from the local church are like orphans who are birthing other orphans into the kingdom without placing them into a family to ensure their growth and maturity. The solution to this problem is to embrace the truth that every church needs and apologist and every apologist needs a church.
