Grace Based Families: Treating the People We Love the Same Way God Treats Us!

- One of the best ways to give children the freedom to be different is by allowing the differences between husband and wife to be freely expressed.

• We need to give the people we love a respectful outlet for telling us what's on their heart—even if it's something we're not excited about hearing.
