Grace Based Parenting: Inner Needs-Greatness

God has built three driving inner needs into every human heart. These needs must be met. They are either going to be met in a legitimate way or an illegitimate way. We'll learn what these three needs are. We'll learn how to meet them in a way that sets our children up to enjoy a secure, significant, and strong relationship with God. And we'll learn how we can not only incorporate the on-going meeting of these needs into the culture of our families, but into our church as well. Additionally we'll learn the biblical target we should be aiming all of our kids towards and how to use our lives and ministry to make this so.

Inner Need No. 1. A Secure Love (Psalm 139: 13-14)

A. A child feels secure love when:

- They know that they are accepted.
- They know that they are affiliated with a loving and honoring home.

• They receive regular and generous helpings of affection. (Mark 9:36-37a)

Inner Need No. 2. A Significant Purpose

A. A child gains a significant purpose when:

- They are regularly affirmed. (Avoid empty praise.)
- They know they have our daily attention. (Luke 18:16)
- They are gracefully admonished. (**Hebrews 12:11**) (Boundaries tell our kids that we care enough to pay attention.)

Ultimate goal: Pave the way for them to find their true significance in Jesus Christ.

B. If our children don't find their ultimate sense of significance in Jesus Christ, they'll turn to counterfeit solutions such as popularity, applause and recognition.

Inner Need No. 3. A Strong Hope

A. A child gains a strong hope when:

- They know their parents are working to develop their God-given abilities.
- Their parents lead them and encourage them to live a life of adventure.
 - God has not called us to raise safe kids, He has called us to raise strong kids. (Joshua 1:9)
- Their parents help them turn their childhood into a series of positive accomplishments.
 - Focus on their strengths rather than their weaknesses.

Ultimate goal: Pave the way for them to find their true strength in Jesus Christ.
