
The Foundations of Evangelical Theology

How is it possible to agree with others on every aspect of a statement of faith, and yet somehow feel like we have a different faith? Could it be that there are some foundational assumptions that bear biblical evaluation? In this talk we will look at the four foundational building blocks of a belief system that will shape everything we build in the superstructure of our faith. Checking the foundations can lead to genuine health and fruitfulness.
