## The Seven Deadly Sins of the Academy and How Christians Can Respond

The Academy provides Christians a place to grow and learn and also to serve. Followers of Jesus in universities have an amazing opportunity to bring the fragrance of Christ into the university community. But in more than 25 years of mentoring Christian professors, I have observed pitfalls which dedicated and well-meaning believers encounter in the university either as students or as professors. In spite of our love for the academy and our love for God, these sins can hinder our effectiveness, hamper our impact, and dampen our zeal for Christ. This seminar will present the seven deadly sins of the academy that will be faced by Christian scholars and university students along with ways to respond to them.

I.	<b>Deadly Sin #1: Pride.</b> Using one's academic work as a means of gaining power and prestige for oneself rather than for God's glory.

II.	<b>Deadly Sin #2: No Sense of Calling.</b> Not embracing teaching and scholarship as a ministry and a holy calling from God to be done for His glory.

III.	<b>Deadly Sin # 3: Dualism.</b> Inadequate love for Christ and His global mission and His all-encompassing Lordship. Three types of myopic dualism.
	A. Epistemological dualism—a worldview that is too narrow because it neglects Christ's Lordship over <i>all</i> things.
	B. Missiological dualism—a worldview that is not truly global and neglects the global mission of Christ to <i>all</i> peoples and <i>all</i> nations.
	C. Spiritual dualism—a worldview that is not passionate for Christ and fervent in obedience to Him.

IV.	<b>Deadly Sin # 4: Greed.</b> Hoarding our time and work for ourselves and focusing more on ideas and things than on people.

V.	<b>Deadly Sin # 5: Lust.</b> Lust for power, prestige, and position leading to overwork, neglect of significant relationships and an unbalanced life.

VI.	<b>Deadly Sin # 6: Fear.</b> Fear of others leading to either failure to share the Good News or manipulation and speaking about Jesus at inappropriate times or settings.
