The Christian Mind: How to Think about Anything from a Gospel Worldview

If the gospel is true, does it change our view of God's world around us? Is there a 'Christian' view of, say, literature? Or politics? Or maths? Or your vocation? How would we work it out? What are the dangers if we don't have clarity on our worldview? What are the practical steps towards thinking intentionally about a Gospel worldview? This session will try to answer these and related questions while offering a robust discussion of the challenges that emerge in developing a Christian mind.

Tim Laurence is European Director of the Veritas Forum, which partners with student ministries in Europe to reconnect leading universities to the gospel through the public pursuit of Truth - inviting Christian professors and apologists to public dialogue with students and non-Christian faculty on big questions for the sake of persuasive evangelism. While London Chairman of the UK Lawyers' Christian Fellowship, Tim arranged, contributed to, and edited *Good News for the Public Square* (2014) – a collection of London-based lectures for Christian lawyers giving a Biblical framework for Christian engagement in law and government. An Oxford graduate in English Literature and a former banking regulation lawyer at international firm Hogan Lovells, Tim is also completing a ThM in Historical Theology with Westminster Theological Seminary, Philadelphia, through its London campus at the John Owen Centre, at London Theological Seminary.
