The Challenges of Preaching Acts

Acts is a unique book in our New Testament. It fills in the story from Jesus' ascension to the imprisonment of Paul. It offers many compelling sermon summaries, as well as some genuinely unique historical accounts. How are we to preach summaries of sermons to other people at a very different time? How are we to preach events that were not recorded to build our anticipation of a repeat? Some will avoid preaching Acts, but this is not the solution. So how can we effectively preach Acts in our contexts?

- II. Normativity A challenge for all of us

 - B. Acts is not "all history" i.e. not everything is an ongoing concern...

NB. Different denominational backgrounds will have differences on issues of whether certain events in Acts are to be considered descriptive or normative for life in the church today. We do not intend to get into discussions here that could threaten our unity. Please be sensitive to one another as we wrestle with preaching Acts in our own contexts.

- 3. Some sing that "we need another Pentecost" but all agree that the Holy Spirit is critical to the existence and witness of the church today.
