# How to Live East of Eden, Part 1: Understanding Qoheleth (The Preacher)

How do we live well in a fallen world? What should be the normal experience of life for a believer? Our teacher, Qoheleth -The Preacher, provides us with a no holds barred exploration into the frustrations of seeking to live lives of significance; lives that should be meaningful and substantial within a reality that refuses to be impressed or altered by human achievement

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### 1. Introduction

- A. Wisdom- The Leader's temptation is to simplify and answer the problems.
- B. Confessions of a cynic?- How does that square with the preacher's humble dependence on God (Ch 2:24-25; 3:14-15; 5:18-20 etc)
- C. Evangelistic tract for secularists?- All experiences 'under the sun' are empty and meaningless for the unbeliever. Yet the struggles expressed are clearly those of a God fearer on behalf of God's covenant people (eg Ch5:1-7)
- D. Two authors- one is dangerous? –Fox and Longman's idea of a Frame narrator introducing Ecclesiastes and concluding with a warning (Ch12:9-14)

### 2. Asking the right questions

- A. Is life meaningless? (hebel/mist/vapour/transient)- See 'readers'
- B. What profit is there? (Yithron/surpluss/net gain)- See 'readers'

A. Seeing through Evangelical folk lore
