Ch3 ¹ There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens:

a time to mourn and a time to dance,

⁹ What do workers gain from their toil? ¹⁰ I have seen the burden God has laid on the human race. ¹¹ He has made everything beautiful in its time. He has also set eternity in the human heart; yet no one can fathom what God has done from beginning to end. ¹² I know that there is nothing better for people than to be happy and to do good while they live. ¹³ That each of them may eat and drink, and find satisfaction in all their toil—this is the gift of God. ¹⁴ I know that everything God does will endure forever; nothing can be added to it and nothing taken from it. God does it so that people will fear him.

A. Identity

Who are you? From identity flows a life perspective or world view.

1. Lord Jim and the quest for self- An atheist's conclusion:

"We act in the belief that we are all of one piece, but we are able to cope with things only because we are a succession of fragments. We cannot shake off the sense that we are enduring selves, and yet we know we are not."... "Lord Jim can never know why he jumped. That is his fate. As a result he can never start his life afresh with a clean slate." (John Gray; Straw Dogs)

¹³ Consider what God has done: Who can straighten what he has made crooked?

- ¹⁴ When times are good, be happy; but when times are bad, consider this: God has made the one as well as the other. Therefore, no one can discover anything about their future. ¹⁵ In this meaningless life of mine I have seen both of these: the righteous perishing in their righteousness, and the wicked living long in their wickedness.
- ¹⁶ Do not be over righteous, neither be overwise- why destroy yourself?
- ¹⁷ Do not be overwicked, and do not be a fool—why die before your time?
- ¹⁸ It is good to grasp the one and not let go of the other. Whoever fears God will avoid all extremes.
