The Jesus Model: How Simple Principles from the Life of Christ Can Transform Your Ministry

Since youth culture is a constantly moving target, those who work with young people are often looking for something "new." What are the latest trends, how do we capture young people's attention, what will make our programs attractive and contemporary? While there is nothing wrong with being trendy, the most profound insights about youth ministry are actually very "old." We forget that Christianity began as a youth movement. Many of Jesus' disciples were teenagers when he called them. How did his youth group launch a movement that changed the world? If Jesus were to teach us how to lead an effective youth ministry today, what would he say?

Dave Patty is the founder and president of Josiah Venture, an organisation focused on training next-generation leaders in 11 countries of Eastern Europe. He dreams of a movement of God among young people in Eastern Europe, one that finds its home in the local church and which transforms society. He lives with his wife Connie and three children in Frydlant, Czech Republic. He holds a BA in Theology and a MA in Education. He has lived and served in Europe for the past 25 years. Before moving to the Czech Republic he ministered to youth in Germany with Cadence International.

He never held an public office, never wrote a book, never led an army or founded an institution. His classroom was the boat and the field, his followers simple fisherman. Rejected and misunderstood by the majority, his ministry lasted only three and a half short years.

But its impact changed the world.

At the end of his service he said, "As the father has send me, I am sending you." His life serves as an example not just in the words he taught, but in the way he went about ministry. Howard Hendricks recognizes this when he asks the question, "How did Jesus Christ train His men? Whenever we study the gospels, we tend to study them exclusively for content." he says. "Why don't we study them for methodology?"

III. How did Christ model the great commission?

Christ modeled the process of making a disciple, as well as the process of building a disciple making ministry.

A. The process of making a disciple

Christ met people where they were at and challenged them to take the next step forward spiritually. In his life we see five basic types of challenges.
